The ACE Mentor Program of Rhode Island (ACE RI) kicked off the 2021-2022 program year with four different groups of students meeting at various times and days of the week, which is wonderful. Even during these difficult times, our volunteer mentors, committee members, and board members found the time to pull together resources, plan, and implement curriculums for each group. Amazing! I couldn't be more proud of our volunteers and the sponsor firms that encourage them to participate. Check out what they've been up to in this newsletter.

I am also happy to announce that ACE RI has joined the United Way of Rhode Island's Afterschool Network (RIAN). 

ACE kicked off programming at the Met in September with a Career Awareness activity with sixteen 9th grade students in Siobhan O'Malley's classroom. Mentors "Zoomed" in while students learned about ACE careers, had a brainstorming competition about how many different jobs it takes to construct a building, and then competed in teams to build the tallest structure using gumdrops and pasta. It was a fun way for students to learn about the ACE fields and all of the jobs connected to the industry. It was so beneficial, we plan on repeating the activity with other 9th grade classrooms in the future.

From October to January, a core group of six 10th through 12th grade students participated in a virtual first year ACE program. Mentors "Zoomed" in while students were in their individual classrooms at the Met on Thursday afternoons. Students kicked off the program with the traditional Gum Drop Pasta Challenge. The following weeks students completed measuring and scale activities, learned how to complete 3D drawings on their Chrome books in Sketch-up, and finished by drawing a barn in Sketch-up. Since it is challenging to get to know the students when the programming is virtual, oneon-one get to know you sessions were scheduled with each student which helped the mentors better understand each student's interests and goals for the program.








During the fall session, 25+ students from Woonsocket to Westerly and all areas in between participated in our virtual meetings. Over 11 weeks a variety of mentoring activities introduced the students to the basics of each ACE discipline and practiced skills relevant across the building industry. Kits containing tools and support materials were mailed directly to students' homes. Despite the virtual setting, activities were not limited to interacting with a computer screen. Activities were developed to take advantage of students' surroundings. They included practicing measuring and drawing plans to scale, building structures like towers and bridges, and exploring their neighborhoods through the eyes of an ACE professional.

Moving into the winter session, the program focuses on the design of a "sustainable visitor center". Over 10 weeks, students apply basic skills learned in the fall session to an ongoing project. By focusing on a single project, the students will be able to explore the individual roles of each discipline and see how each of the ACE roles collaborate with each other. The winter session kicked off on Tuesday, January 11th. The sessions will then run weekly on Tuesdays from 4:00pm-5:15pm.



FIRST YEAR PROGRAM






The ACE-RI advanced student program continues with more students participating than any prior year. Currently 15 students and 10 mentors are meeting weekly via ZOOM. Attendance has been consistent since mid-October for the 4:00-5:30pm Thursday sessions.

Students are working on the annual ACE-CIRT National Design Competition with submissions due on March 16, 2022. Two teams were created based on student interests. Each team is working on one a different project selected from the options offered in the Competition.

Urban Renewal: Students have selected to pursue the design of a new MBTA train station at the site of the abandoned station in Pawtucket. The site will include housing, a commercial greenhouse, community gardens, as well as a CVS and a Co-op grocery store modeled after Urban Greens in Providence. 


ADVANCED PROGRAM

Memorial of the Future: Students have chosen to pursue a memorial for indigenous people that will be built at Ninigret Park in Charlestown RI. We visited the Tomaquag Museum and were inspired by the basket weaving patterns, stone cairns and the belief in honoring the ancestors but paving the path for the future seven generations. The memorial will be a modernized wingwam or longhouse using modern materials that will be long lasting. There will be two path that will allow different experiences which will include colors, symbols, stone cairns and basket weaving patters to be seen along the path. The idea of the seven generations will also be honored in the design.









In 2021 we received \$31,175 in donations. This was due to a great effort by our Advisory Board, Committee Volunteers, and especially our donors. We are grateful for all the effort and generosity.

These funds were raised primarily from two drives. First, our Annual Fundraising Breakfast. The breakfast was responsible for over \$22,000 of the funds raised through in-person attendance and our sponsor firms. 2021 saw our first increase in sponsorship levels in many years, but those sponsorships included increased marketing for the sponsor firms. ACE RI provides mentions and logo placement for sponsor firms in our marketing materials and on social media, along with speaking opportunities and free tickets to our fundraising events.

The second drive, new to us in 2021, was the 401Gives charity event. This online event lasted only a few days, with a giving "frenzy" on April 1. This event is for the non-profit organizations in RI and is hosted by the United Way and GiveGab.com. We set a goal to raise \$10,000 during this event and were able to reach \$5,245. Although we didn't

get to our goal, we still consider this event a success. We are very thankful for the 70+ donations we received in just a few days. The remainder of the money raised was achieved through individual PayPal and direct check donations sent to ACE RI.

Again, thank you to those donors. Every dollar helps. We have planned our 2022 fundraising efforts and will continue the Annual Breakfast tradition this spring. We will also participate in the 401Gives Campaign again this year. Be on the lookout for our announcements about these events as they get closer.

This year, our fundraising goal is to raise \$50,000 to provide scholarships, training supplies, and food and beverage to our students. We appreciate all that you do to help us accomplish this goal.
